

Clinic's Vision Services Expand to Include Uninsured Children

Guadalupe Clinic now provides eye exams to uninsured children 7-17 years old! While most children have access to eye exams through private or state insurance, this is unfortunately not the case for all – specifically those who are undocumented.

Recently, Dr. Emily Johnson met Ana, a 12-year-old who had recently immigrated to Wichita from Mexico. Speaking only Spanish, Ana shared that she was living with relatives while she and her mother looked for more permanent housing. She had broken her glasses and was having a hard time seeing, especially at

school. When Dr. Johnson tested Ana she found a significant prescription of 20/40. This means that what Ana can clearly see from 20 feet away, a person with healthy vision would be able to see from 40 feet



away. She says, "Ana is a perfect example of how common it is for children to pass vision screens at school, when in fact they see letters and numbers as blurry. A fuzzy letter is still a letter when they are reading the eye chart."

With of Dr. the help Johnson, CAIRN Health, and Rochester Labs, Anna has a new pair of prescription glasses. She can now improve her visual acuity, see details in the distance, and focus learning at the same level as her classmates without added strain and blur.

This expansion of our services has illustrated that a pair of glasses can change the course of a person's future and especially at a time when a child is reading to learn.

Why do I volunteer at Guadalupe Clinic?

I was first interested volunteering at the Clinic so that I could participate in teaching students from the JayDoc Community Clinic as well as those studying at the Kansas College of Osteopathic Medicine (KSCOM).

As I began to serve the Clinic in a preceptor role, it also proved to be an opportunity to introduce students to the barriers imposed on patients by our current healthcare system, and to challenge those students to help be the solution to those barriers as they advance through their careers. At Guadalupe Clinic medical students meet wonderful people who are living in poverty because of their circumstances, not by choice, and who are striving to work themselves and their families out of it. It is not only an opportunity for them to practice their medical skills, but also to learn to be compassionate listeners to the patients sitting in front of them.

That said, the most compelling reason I volunteer is to serve the poor. It is an obedience to the way of Christ. Guadalupe Clinic's patients are outcast by the healthcare system. They are hurting and have no means to pay for the needed resources to address their health

problems. These individuals are who are extremely grateful to have someone listen to their concerns and then work to find ways to meet their complex medical needs. Any health problem or illness threatens their ability to work, often low-paying jobs with benefits, no and

in turn threatens their ability to buy food and provide shelter. By volunteering, I feel I can help them through their struggle. In the past year I've not met one patient who was ungrateful or unappreciative for the help they received. Most are even willing to follow through on the treatment plan we develop with them.

Other reasons to volunteer at Guadalupe Clinic are the ease of seeing patients and the staff. As a retired physician, the Clinic's model and EMR allow me to see patients without the encumbrance of the larger medical system. Documentation is relatively straightforward and the EMR easy to learn and navigate. The staff also do a wonderful job of sharing additional resources with volunteers and patients to help connect them to services and procedures outside the scope of Guadalupe Clinic. It is a pleasant place to volunteer where everyone shares a vision of serving the poor and bringing some help and comfort to those in need.
